
Jamie Baulch Inspires Pupils at Annual Awards Evening

By allowing pupils to interact with her, Lexi has helped develop several pupils' behaviour, she had even been used to help improve reading skills by getting pupils to read out loud to her as they feel they won't be judged if they make



a mistake. Jay Knowles who has Autism (pictured with Lexi above) often visits Lexi to help him avoid angry outbursts, who says this helps him remain focussed and progress in his lessons.

'There are thousands of job vacancies in the demolition industry that need filling and the reason is lack of training facilities. This piece of kit which costs over forty thousand pounds allows us to train people in only two weeks. We are currently touring the country visiting schools for free to try and promote and encourage pupils to consider a career in this field.'

Intrigued and willing to learn I donned my high visibility jacket and had a go at crushing a concrete lintel and recycling the steel, the experience was very realistic with life like sounds and movement. Needless to say the pupils absolutely loved it apparently its even better than an X Box!

Pupils enter Hoarding Board Competition to celebrate merger



Subscription of the entry from Fairwater and the ASD base at Fairwater were picked to take part in the 'Hoarding Board Competition' initiative run by the contractors Wilmot Dixon. The one off piece completed by the Art Department was design to symbolise the merging of the two schools into Cwmbran High School and the entry from Fairwater came runner up. Overseen by Art teachers Mr Darmanin and Mrs Evans who explained to me the painting uses a tree that branches out to form words that depict the values of our school. Inset are symbols chosen by pupils to represent every subject taught at the school.

Mr Darmanin said 'it's very different to what we normally do in class working on an 8' x 4' board is a lot bigger than pupil are used to!'

'It has helped pupils develop their skills and work as part of a team, it is also the first time most have painted upside down!'

The ASD base also had a very impressive entry coordinated by Base Manager

Esther Nicolaou who said . 'The pupils each included a jigsaw piece that features on the National Autism Awareness logo. On each piece pupils expressed their own feelings about what autism means to them. Wilmot Dixon now plan to use the photographs on their publicity information to help spread the awareness of autism.'



Building Work on track for Completion


he joint student council of Fairwater and Llantarnam Schools have been given the opportunity to inspect the progress of building works for Cwmbran High School.

The new school, due to open next September, will see Fairwater School and Llantarnam School close, and the current Fairwater School site revamped.

Nine students were invited to look around the inside of the lower school building where major work is underway and to ask questions of head teacher Helen Coulson.

The students were accompanied on their visit by contractors from Willmott Dixon Construction.

Mrs Coulson said that the senior leadership team at the school is





"extremely pleased with the progress that is being made" in the lower school; where a significant amount of the £6 million budget is being spent.

There will be 19 new classrooms, a computer science area, a new sixth form facility, a supportive learning area and a brand new canteen.

There will also be a specialist hearing impaired base, an autistic spectrum disorder base and a number of offices and meeting rooms.

Most of the work on the upper school building will happen during the summer holidays, but work will begin at the end of June.

Plans for the upper school building include refurbishment of the current sixth form area into classrooms, a large performance hall, a new reception area, modern classrooms, additional fencing around the school and a new drop off area for children to be dropped off or picked up from the site.

Mrs Coulson said: "We now have a full compliment of staff; the curriculum has been agreed and a series of transition days and events to bring the pupils from their current schools together is underway. "I have no doubt that Cwmbran High School will be a high performing, academic school where all pupils will succeed."

She reassured that works to the classrooms will be completed by September ready for the new school year, with the performance hall on schedule to be complete before Christmas.

Year Nine Fairwater School pupil, Tyler Powell, said: "When we were first told about the plans to close the school we were a bit worried but now that we can actually see the changes happening we are really excited."

The closure of the schools is part of the 21st Century Schools Programme that aims to reduce surplus places.

In April, a petition of more than 4,000 signatures was handed to Torfaen council calling for Llantarnam school to be saved.

But the authority maintained that Fairwater School was the best location for the new school.
